Entry of grades in 2018

1. That it was raised that it was more difficult to enter assessment data for essays and examinations into Gradebook than it was for tests and internal assessment measures. This was acknowledged and additional in-house training would be provided within faculties

- to assist staff with the transition and to demonstrate the integration of Gradebook with Turnitin Feedback Studio.
- 2. That it was raised that where extensive commentary was provided to students in large cohorts (such as that provided to law students) it would be time-consuming for teaching staff to enter comments. It was acknowledged that administrative staff already entered grades and that in the transition period this was likely to continue. Staff who used Turnitin Feedback Studio would be required to enter comments.

- 3. That a concern was raised with respect to clause 9(g), specifically "bring the University into disrepute" and whether it strayed into the realm of freedom of speech. It was noted that colleagues in the Faculty of Law could provide some useful direction on these points.
- 4. That is was suggested that the Student Discipline Regulations should also be reviewed to include reference to the Harmful Digital Communications Act 2015 and to ensure that they were consistent with the Code of Student Conduct.

That a concern was raised that as the Articulation Agreement was a legal contract the wording of 2.1: "To maintain academic and funding approval for the papers and the qualification", could pose a risk to the University as it was a promise to maintain qualifications for the life of the agreement.

- 1. That staff were encouraged to submit study leave reports in a timely manner to ensure that the University could capitalise on new relationships, partnerships or opportunities that had arisen during, or were subsequent to, the period of study leave.
- 2. That it was suggested that external contracts need to be managed to enable successful researchers to avail themselves of study leave.
- 3. That clarification was required with regard to whether staff taking study leave were required to outline how supervision would be managed during the period of leave. For instance, were staff required to detail whether they, another member of the supervision panel, or another nominated supervisor, would assume supervision responsibilities.
- 4. That co-ordinators should ensure that reports were submitted with the information categorised correctly.
- 5. That it was suggested that where staff were teaching small programmes, the ability to secure a teaching fellow to cover the leave period would enable more staff to take advantage of the study leave provision. It was noted that financial matters would be the purview of the Dean, however, there was some central support available.
- 6. That it was raised that it would be useful to look at practices at a faculty level with regard to study leave to ensure there was consistency across the University. It was noted that the development of an annual study leave plan for each faculty would provide greater transparency.
